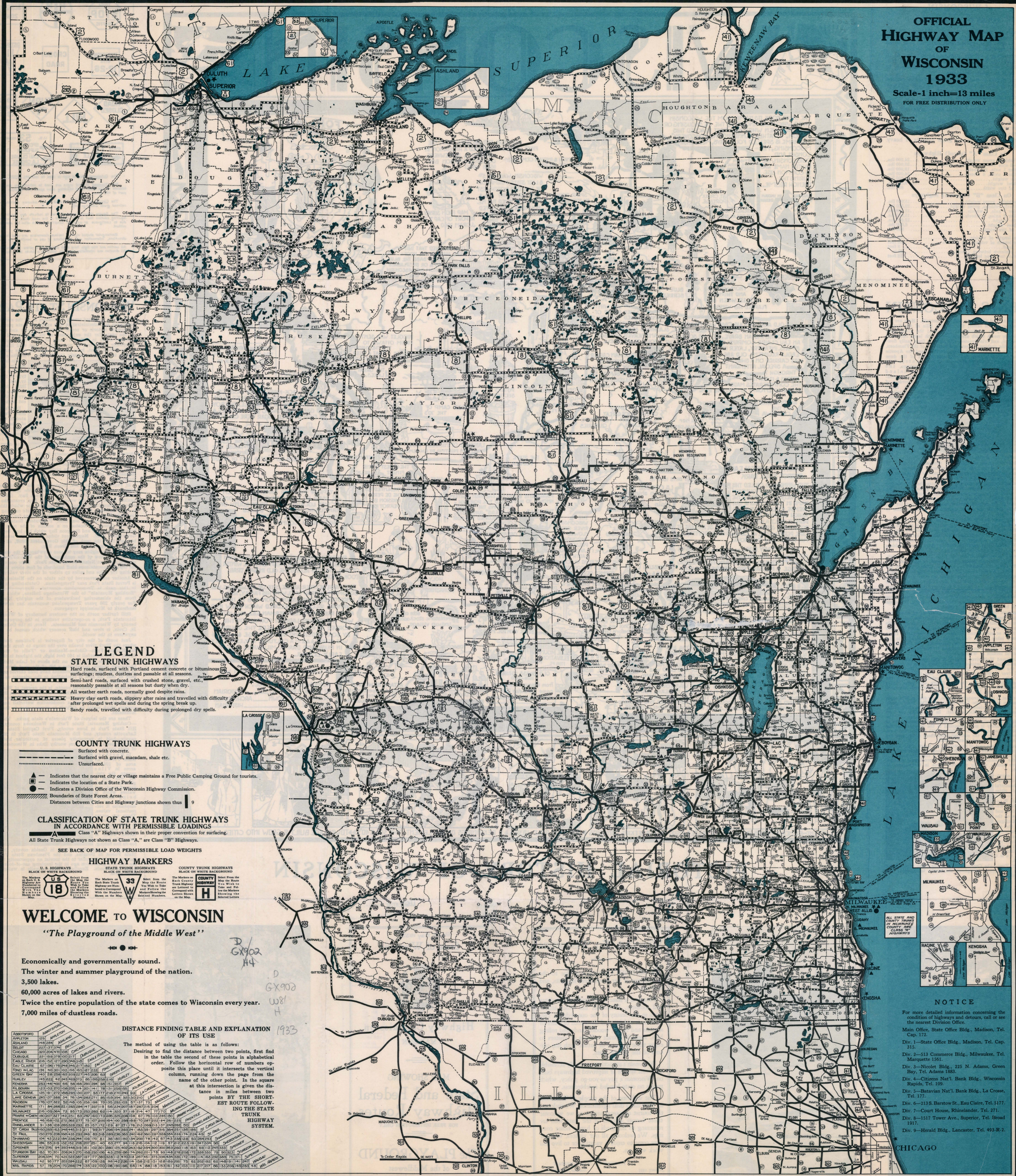


**OFFICIAL

**LEGEND**

**STATE TRUNK HIGHWAYS**

- Hard roads, surfaced with Portland cement concrete or bituminous surfacings; mudless, dustless and passable at all seasons.
- Semi-hard roads, surfaced with crushed stone, gravel, etc., reasonably passable at all seasons but dusty when dry.
- All weather earth roads, normally good despite rains.
- Heavy clay earth roads, slippery after rains and travelled with difficulty after prolonged wet spells and during the spring break up.
- Sandy roads, travelled with difficulty during prolonged dry spells.

**COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAYS**

- Surfaced with concrete.
- Surfaced with gravel, macadam, shale etc.
- Unsurfaced.

**DISTANCE FINDING TABLE AND EXPLANATION  
OF ITS USE**

The method of using the table is as follows:  
Desiring to find the distance between two points, first find in the table the second of these points in alphabetical order. Follow the horizontal row of numbers opposite this place until it intersects the vertical column, running down the page from the name of the other point. In the square at this intersection is given the distance in miles between two points BY THE SHORTEST ROUTE FOLLOWING THE STATE TRUNK HIGHWAY SYSTEM.
