New Motor Vehicle Dealership Compliance Checklist from DFI



The <u>Wisconsin Department of Financial Institutions (DFI)</u> has developed a new <u>Motor Vehicle Dealership Compliance</u> <u>Checklist</u> to help motor vehicle dealers confirm that their operations are compliant before they start conducting business. Established motor vehicle dealerships are encouraged to review this new checklist periodically and when major updates are planned.

While the new checklist does not address every financing regulation, it covers many of the issues the DFI commonly cites in examinations and complaint investigations of motor vehicle dealerships that originate installment contracts or leases but do not retain or service those contracts. If the motor vehicle dealership retains contracts, be sure to also review the DFI's Buy Here Pay Here Motor Vehicle Dealership Compliance Checklist.

Vehicle emissions control systems: what not to do

Reminder: It is illegal to remove, tamper or defeat vehicle emissions control systems.

The Clean Air Act (CAA) prohibits anyone from tampering with an emissions control device on a motor vehicle by removing it or making it inoperable. It is also a violation of the CAA to manufacture, sell, or install a part for a motor vehicle that bypasses, defeats, or renders inoperative any emissions control device.

The penalties for CAA violations include fines and jail time and can greatly impact a business. If any dealer discovers an aftermarket emissions tampering or bypass device upon a vehicle, they may call the Inspection Maintenance Unit for assistance. The vehicle may not be legal to operate on the road, even if the item is disclosed in writing to the customer.



Online Voluntary Dealer Training on April 15, 2025

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation is offering voluntary dealer training to current and prospective motor vehicle dealers and their representatives.

The program covers the rules and regulations of doing business as a motor vehicle dealer in the state of Wisconsin.

Topics include:

- how to reassign titles and complete odometer disclosures
- everything you want to know about the Wisconsin Buyer's Guide
- the laws of advertising vehicles
- how to complete the motor vehicle purchase contract and title and registration application form
- the proper use of dealer plates
- the mandatory display law

This free training is held virtually via Microsoft Teams (you will need access to a computer and the internet). We strongly encourage newly licensed dealers and dealer applicants to consider training, but all licensed dealers are welcome. This optional training is not a substitute for an initial inspection.

The next training will be held on Tuesday, April 15, 2025. The four-hour training begins at 10:00am and includes a 30-minute break for lunch.

The Dealer Licensing Unit (DLU) issues and renews multiple business license types. Individual licenses are issued to individuals who are selling or purchasing vehicles on behalf of dealerships. DLU answers dealer licensing questions as well as provides information about consumer harm and how to file a dealer complaint to the general public.
